Throughout the publication, references to the state fiscal year may be abbreviated as SFY25 and the federal fiscal year may be abbreviated as FFY24.

READINESS IS OUR PRIORITY

From planned deployments overseas to rapid response for natural disasters, we were ready to serve. Ohio Guard members assisted in hurricane support in North Carolina and Florida. We also provided medical, dental, and vision services to more than 1,000 patients in Xenia and Greene County when we collaborated with Greene County Public Health during GuardCare.

CYBERSECURITY CONTINUES TO BE A MAJOR INITIATIVE

The Ohio Cyber Reserve responded quickly and provided support that was needed when two governmental entities were attacked.

GROWTH IS IMPORTANT TO THE FUTURE OF THE OHIO NATIONAL GUARD

While we continue to fulfill our two main directives to support our state and nation, we also must position ourselves to be ready for emerging missions. We now live in a world of great power competition with known adversaries. This year the Ohio Air National Guard prepared for this during Live in 25, which marked the first time in Ohio Air National Guard history where all four wings collaborated for an exercise, at the Wilmington Air Park in Wilmington, Ohio. The Ohio National Guard stands ready to meet the security challenges ahead.

OHIO NATIONAL GUARD HISTORY

JULY 25, 1788

NORTHWEST TERRITORY MILITIA

The Ohio National Guard was established on July 25, 1788, in Marietta, Ohio, as the Northwest Territory Militia. This early military force was modeled after the European system of the Common Militia – ordinary citizenry who were liable to perform military duty in the event of an emergency. The laws directed that “all male inhabitants between the age of fifteen and fifty, shall be liable to and perform military duty.”

1803

OHIO MILITIA

When Ohio achieved statehood in 1803, the organization became known as the Ohio Militia. The Common Militia formed the basis of Ohio's contribution in the first half of the 19th century and was augmented by independent militia companies formed in many of Ohio's major cities. Nearly 319,000 Ohioans served in the Union Army during the Civil War and 144 of them were awarded the Medal of Honor. This includes the first recipient, Jacob Parrott of the 33rd Ohio Volunteer Infantry.



1903

MILITIA LAW OF 1903

In 1903, the federal government enacted the Militia Law of 1903, which gave increased federal funds and equipment to the National Guard. The bill was sponsored by Charles Dick, a congressman from Canton and a major general in the Ohio National Guard. The act transformed our nation's militia into the modern National Guard.

1950s

OHIO NATIONAL GUARD SPLIT INTO ARMY & AIR

Following World War II, the Ohio National Guard was split into Army and Air National Guard components, as occurred nationwide. Both formations remained a vital piece of national defense during the many decades of the Cold War. Numerous federal activations tested the Citizen-Soldiers' and Citizen-Airmen's professionalism, and changes to federal standards ensured Ohio units were ready to answer the call here and abroad.



1864

OHIO NATIONAL GUARD

In 1864, an act of the Ohio General Assembly changed the name of the Ohio Militia to the Ohio National Guard. Throughout the late 19th century, the Ohio National Guard transformed into the more permanent and structured militia force that we know today. Companies were formed in each city or town that could support it. Battalions and regiments were then organized regionally. Weekly drills and summer encampments sharpened the troops' military capabilities.



WWI, WWII

The first half of the 20th century demonstrated the new National Guard's importance to the state, country, and world. Ohio's contribution to the American Armies abroad in both World Wars was extensive and was built primarily around the 37th "Buckeye" Division. At home, the Buckeyes remained busy responding to the needs of their fellow Ohioans in response to natural disasters as well as many instances of civil and labor unrest.



2001

Following the 9/11 terrorist attacks on American soil in 2001, the Ohio National Guard has demonstrated the evolution of the Guard from a strategic reserve to an operational force. Buckeye Soldiers and Airmen have performed every assigned mission during the War on Terrorism and integrated effortlessly into the national defense. Ohio National Guard members continue to answer the call to support their fellow citizens throughout Ohio and nationwide.



HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

07.03.2024

TWO OHIO SOLDIERS AWARDED MEDAL OF HONOR

Philip G. Shadrach and George D. Wilson were posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor for their actions during the Great Locomotive Chase in the Civil War. Also known as the Andrews' Raid, it involved a group of Union soldiers who stole a Confederate train to disrupt Southern supply lines.

01.09.2025

80TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE LUZON LANDINGS

The 37th Infantry Division played a significant role in the liberation of Luzon from the Japanese, including freeing over 1,300 internees at Bilibid Prison on Feb. 4, 1945, and attacking the Japanese at Mount Pacawagan on April 21, 1945. The 25-day battle ended the threat of the Japanese army north of Manila.

03.03.2025

80TH ANNIVERSARY OF BATTLE OF MANILLA ENDING

The Ohio National Guard's 37th Infantry Division played a crucial role in the Battle of Manila during World War II, fighting alongside other units to liberate the city from Japanese occupation.

05.08.2025

80TH ANNIVERSARY OF V-E DAY

The world celebrated Victory in Europe, or V-E Day, marking the end of World War II in the European Theater of operations. Eleven Ohio National Guard units served in Europe during the war.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT & OHIO NATIONAL GUARD LEADERSHIP



GOVERNOR

Mike DeWine

As the commander in chief of the Ohio National Guard, the governor has the authority to activate the Ohio National Guard to support and assist local authorities during state emergencies or for homeland defense.



ADJUTANT GENERAL

Brigadier General Matthew S. Woodruff

As a member of the governor's cabinet, the adjutant general is responsible for the command of the Ohio Army National Guard, Ohio Air National Guard, and State Defense Force. The adjutant general supervises the heads of these components in the day-to-day operation and management of the readiness, fiscal, personnel, equipment, and real property resources of the agency.



ASSISTANT QUARTERMASTER GENERAL

Colonel Thomas P. Caldwell

Responsible for all property of the Adjutant General's Department. He heads the Directorate of Installation Management and Resources, which oversees facilities management and planning, as well as contracting and finance.



COMMAND SENIOR ENLISTED LEADER

Command Sergeant Major Scott M. Barga

As the highest-ranking enlisted member of the Ohio National Guard, the command senior enlisted leader serves as the adjutant general's principal advisor on matters affecting training, readiness, utilization, health of the force, and enlisted professional development.



U.S. PROPERTY AND FISCAL OFFICER

Lieutenant Colonel Joseph A. Schwade

Serves in Title 10 active-duty status and is responsible for oversight and accounting of federal funds and property in the possession of the Ohio National Guard. He directs inventories, audits, and investigations to ensure accountability and compliance.

DIRECTOR OF THE JOINT STAFF

Brigadier General Jeffrey Watkins

Responsible for executing joint Ohio National Guard operations, actions, and activities to help prepare for an effective response to contingency operations in a federal or state emergency. The director oversees the joint staff and advises the adjutant general on issues and policies relating to the operations, sustainment, and administration of the Ohio National Guard.

COMMANDER, STATE DEFENSE FORCE

The State Defense Force is commanded by a brigadier general (non-federally recognized) who reports directly to the adjutant general and maintains a staff of about 30 personnel.

ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL FOR ARMY

Colonel Jonathan M. Stewart

Responsible for establishing policies, priorities, and oversight for the readiness of the Ohio Army National Guard in six brigade-level major subordinate commands.



CHIEF OF STAFF

Brigadier General Jeffrey Watkins

Oversees the Army staff and full-time workforce, and advises the assistant adjutant general for Army on issues and policies relating to the operations, sustainment, and administration of the Ohio Army National Guard.



STATE COMMAND SERGEANT MAJOR

Command Sergeant Major William A. Workley

Serves as the principal enlisted advisor to the assistant adjutant general for Army. He observes training and all matters concerning the enlisted members of the Ohio Army National Guard and their Families.



STATE COMMAND CHIEF WARRANT OFFICER

Chief Warrant Officer 5 Richard W. Kerwood

Provides direction, guidance, resources, assistance, and supervision of the Ohio Army National Guard Warrant Officer Cohort, overseeing warrant officer leader development and mentorship while providing essential advice to the assistant adjutant general for Army on warrant officer issues.

OHIO AIR NATIONAL GUARD (OHANG)



ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL FOR AIR

Major General David B. Johnson

Responsible for directing the Ohio Air National Guard's day-to-day operations and administration, and assists in establishing policy to ensure mission readiness of four wings and support units.



DEPUTY ASSISTANT ADJUTANT GENERAL FOR AIR

Brigadier General Francisco J. Dominquez

Supports the assistant adjutant general for Air in managing the organization's operations, administration, mission readiness, and policies.



CHIEF OF STAFF

Brigadier General Clarence K. Maynus

Oversees Air staff and advises the assistant adjutant general for Air on issues and policies relating to the operations, sustainment, and administration of the Ohio Air National Guard.



STATE COMMAND CHIEF MASTER SERGEANT

Chief Master Sergeant Troy R. Taylor

Advises Ohio Air National Guard senior leadership on matters influencing the health, morale, and welfare of the organization's assigned enlisted Airmen and their Families.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT & OHIO NATIONAL GUARD DUAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The Ohio National Guard is a unique military enterprise, with a dual mission that consists of federal and state roles, administered by the Ohio Adjutant General's Department. The adjutant general is responsible to the governor of the State of Ohio and the president of the United States. These two responsibilities involve preparing for and responding to current and emerging homeland security threats, homeland defense initiatives, and national defense roles and missions.

For state missions, the governor, through the adjutant general, commands Guard forces. The governor can call the National Guard into action during local or statewide emergencies, natural disasters, or civil disturbances. In addition, the president can activate the National Guard for participation in federal missions, including deployment of Guard units worldwide. When federalized, Guard units are commanded by the combatant commander of the geographic region in which they are operating.

The Adjutant General's Department comprises the Ohio Army and Air National Guard, as well as the State Defense Force, which is composed of the Ohio Military Reserve, Ohio Naval Militia, and the Ohio Cyber Reserve. Each entity is distinctly organized with multiple capabilities.

Always Ready, Always There.

- The adjutant general and the assistant adjutants general for Army and Air are State of Ohio employees serving in a federally recognized status.
- The majority of individuals serving in the Ohio National Guard are traditional Guard members, known as Citizen-Soldiers and -Airmen. They serve part time, have civilian jobs, and live throughout the state.
- The Ohio National Guard retains a full-time unit staff at Joint Force Headquarters of Active Guard Reserve members, Title 32 dual status federal technicians (uniformed military members), and Title 5 federal technicians (non-uniformed civilians).
- The Adjutant General's Department is authorized 300 state employees that manage state funds and resources, and operate and maintain the agency's facilities and programs.
- The State Defense Force does not utilize full-time unit staff.
- State active duty is the governor's authority to mobilize the Ohio National Guard and State Defense Force.

ORGANIZATIONAL IMPACT WORKFORCE

The Ohio National Guard receives federal funding through National Guard Bureau that encompass funding for operations; constructing, renovating, and sustaining facilities; acquiring and maintaining equipment; and compensating (pay/benefits) uniformed members of the Ohio National Guard and civilian employees. State appropriations augment the administrative costs of the Ohio National Guard and the Adjutant General's Department (including elements of the State Defense Force), and include funding for State of Ohio employee compensation, state active duty, and the state scholarship program.



09.30.2024 HURRICANE HELENE

Governor DeWine activated the Ohio National Guard to assist North Carolina in recovery efforts following Hurricane Helene.

Six Soldiers flew a CH-47 Chinook helicopter over 55 hours, transporting 280,000 pounds of food, water, equipment, and personnel to impacted communities throughout the region. The Soldiers and the aircraft they flew were an integral element of getting critical items and supplies to impacted communities in the region, many that were inaccessible by road.

121st Air Refueling Wing Fatality Search and Recovery Team

Eleven Airmen collaborated with local, state, and military agencies to conduct search and recovery operations across mountainous terrain and riverbeds as well as perform wellness checks and damage assessments.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS

The Ohio National Guard Community Relations (COMREL) program is responsible for administering public support requests. Guard members support hundreds of communities and military appreciation events, engaging with Ohioans throughout the state. 

The Ohio National Guard Counterdrug Program grew from 58 service members in FFY23 to 83 in FFY24 and a 58% increase in overall funding with an execution rate of 99%. Analysts assisted in efforts to anticipate, deter, and defeat the threat of illegal substances, trafficking, and violence in Ohio, providing full-time support to:

- five federal agencies at 15 locations with 31 counterdrug program members
- 25 state/local agencies at 28 locations with 36 counterdrug program members

Additionally, the program participated in 290 prevention events, engaging 14,607 participants, including the We Are the Change Rally, Drug Enforcement Administration Drug Take Back Day, Waves of Awareness, Recovery Jam, and Project Noelle, which distributed gifts to over 3,458 children affected by drug abuse in 10 Ohio counties.

GuardCare 2024 provides free medical care to citizens of Greene County

The Ohio National Guard and other government, civilian and military medical professionals partnered with local and state public health agencies to conduct "Greene County GuardCare 2024: Warriors for Health" at the Greene County Career Center in Xenia, Ohio, Aug. 10-11, 2024. During the weekend event, more than 1,000 Ohioans received free, comprehensive medical care including screenings, physicals, immunizations, optometry services, dental care, hearing tests, lab draws, nutrition counseling, mental and behavioral health services, women's health services, and physical therapy.

STATE OF OHIO EMPLOYEES

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT

The Adjutant General's Department employs a workforce reflective of its dual status as a federal and state agency. In addition to full-time federal civilians and military members, State of Ohio civilian employees are integral to both the success of steady-state, day-to-day operations and the overall mission readiness of the Ohio National Guard as they contribute critical support, skill sets, and experience to offices and divisions within the Adjutant General's Department.

They work in areas including construction and facilities management, maintenance, environmental science, geospatial information systems, information technology and web services, administrative/clerical support, accounting, government affairs and liaison, public relations and communications, lodging and hospitality, firefighting, purchasing and contracting, and human resources.

DIRECTORATE OF INSTALLATION MANAGEMENT AND RESOURCES (DIMR)

Oversight of several subordinate divisions responsible for all aspects of state-owned and -operated property and transaction processes including existing facilities, new capital projects, finance and budgeting, procurement and contracting, energy and environment, geospatial systems, business services, and electronic security systems.

ENERGY & ENVIRONMENTAL

The Energy Office has completed LED lighting upgrades at field maintenance shops in Mansfield and Chillicothe, and the Bowling Green Training and Community Center. The initial investment was \$420,000 with an eight-year payback, enabling improved operational capability, reduced maintenance costs, and reduction in electrical usage and cost. The average combined cost savings from the upgrades is expected to be \$50,000 annually. An additional \$575,000 LED lighting investment for the Combined Support Maintenance Shop and USPFO Warehouse at Defense Supply Center Columbus in August 2025 is expected to yield a \$60,000 annual cost savings.

The Energy Office is currently collaborating with The Ohio State University to develop a behind-the-meter microgrid concept at the Springfield Armed Forces Reserve Center, which is meant to provide critical mission resiliency, power assurance, and utility cost reduction. It is anticipated that the project will go into design in late August 2025, with construction to begin sometime in SFY26.

CAMP PERRY LODGING & CONFERENCE CENTER

On the shores of Lake Erie, near Port Clinton, Ohio, staff maintains and operates a variety of modern short-term accommodations and meeting/reception areas available for rental to current/former military personnel and the general public.

FACILITIES MANAGEMENT

Upkeep of existing armories, readiness centers, and other state-owned buildings, including plumbing, electrical, HVAC systems, and general infrastructure maintenance (including foundation, roofing, and painting).

FINANCE

Oversees accounting (management of department funds, budgeting, receipts payable, purchase requests); asset management (property, inventory, fleet management); and procurement for both operational and capital improvement projects.

MAINTENANCE

State maintenance repair workers conduct preventative, routine care and as-needed repairs at more than 50 facilities (armories, readiness centers, other buildings) at over 40 different locations throughout the state.

PLANS & PLANNING

Inspects, plans, estimates, and programs money for construction and renovation projects for all Ohio Army National Guard facilities; responsible for purchase of supplies and services (including mowing, trash pickup, security guards); processes recruiting storefront leases; contracts all design and construction projects.


STATE HUMAN RESOURCES

FIREFIGHTERS

All four Ohio Air National Guard wings (and the civilian airports they are collocated with) are supported by base fire stations manned by full-time State of Ohio firefighters capable of providing crash, rescue, fire, and emergency services. Mutual aid agreements with surrounding municipalities allow for increased support at the base, if needed, and make base fire department resources and manpower available to nearby communities.

GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS

The Government Affairs Office is responsible directly to the adjutant general to engage all levels of government and with key stakeholders. The office serves as the Adjutant General's Department/ Ohio National Guard proponent for addressing elected officials and tracking constituent inquiries, managing political communications, and developing policies that enhance the capabilities and capacity of the organization. Through synchronized communications, interactions, engagements, outreach, and dialogue with state/federal officials/ legislators and other stakeholders, the Government Affairs Office shapes awareness and perceptions of the Ohio National Guard and State Defense Force while advocating for legislation (appropriations) beneficial to infrastructure, force structure, equipment, and resources.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S DEPARTMENT / THE OHIO NATIONAL GUARD

JOINT FORCE HEADQUARTERS



The Ohio National Guard is organized under a joint Army and Air National Guard structure with the Adjutant General of Ohio commanding. In support of the adjutant general, the Joint Force Headquarters provides executive-level command and control of the Ohio National Guard through a fully-integrated joint staff and the headquarters elements for the Ohio Army National Guard, Ohio Air National Guard, and State Defense Force. It provides administrative, human resources, operations, logistics, communications, legal, fiscal, and public affairs support to the entire Ohio National Guard to include other programs and services related to wellness, Military Families, education, and facilities.

The Joint Force Headquarters serves as the proponent to develop and implement policy and regulations and to maintain readiness (managing the availability of personnel, resources, and assets required to respond to national- and state-level missions). It coordinates military support at the request of the governor in the event of a disaster or state emergency, as well as homeland defense, defense support of civil authorities, and other domestic emergency missions within the United States. The Joint Force Headquarters also serves as a liaison with National Guard Bureau, the Secretaries of the Army and Air Force, and the Department of Defense to provide ready units and Guard members to support the National Defense Strategy and contingency operations worldwide.

JOINT CAPABILITIES AND TRAINING

The Ohio National Guard has several unique assets in its force to help fulfill missions in support of homeland defense and homeland security, domestic operations, and aid to civil authorities during natural or man-made disasters. Being ready to accomplish those missions requires consistent training to maintain proficiency as well as developing working relationships with local, state, and federal agency partners.

52ND CIVIL SUPPORT TEAM (CST)

The CST specializes in identifying chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and high-yield explosive agents/substances, assessing current and projected consequences, advising on response measures, and assisting with appropriate requests for state and federal support.

Nearly 300 personnel from 52 federal, state, local and private industry partners participated in Exercise Toxic Buckeye in Ohio and West Virginia, Sept. 16-20, 2024.

CYBERSECURITY INITIATIVES

As part of its homeland defense mission, the Adjutant General's Department is leading a number of efforts in Ohio to protect state and local government, critical infrastructure, businesses, and private citizens from cyber threats and attacks.

OHIO CYBER COLLABORATION COMMITTEE (OC3)

At the direction of the governor, the Adjutant General's Department has brought together more than 200 public, private, military, and educational organizations to form the OC3. It provides for collaboration between key stakeholders to strengthen cybersecurity for all in the State of Ohio and to develop a stronger cybersecurity infrastructure.

OHIO CYBER RANGE (OCR)

The Ohio Cyber Range is a secure virtual environment used for cybersecurity training and technology development. OCR is accessible for competitions, training, and as a testing environment for schools, governments, and businesses. Range sites are located at the University of Cincinnati and the University of Akron.

HOMELAND RESPONSE FORCE (HRF)

The HRF specializes in casualty search and extraction, emergency medical triage and treatment, security, and mass casualty decontamination in support of unified multiagency incident command during a state or national emergency. Regular external evaluations, often conducted at Camp James A. Garfield Joint Military Training Center, maintain the HRF's accreditations and affirm its collective capability to perform these critical missions.

STATE PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

The State Partnership Program began as part of the European Reassurance Initiative in the 1990s. The program's intent was to partner with former Warsaw Pact/Soviet-influenced nations in Eastern Europe as a stability initiative. The SPP links U.S. states with a partner country to improve bilateral relations. The program's goals reflect an evolving international affairs mission for the National Guard, to promote regional stability and civil-military relationships in support of U.S. policy objectives.

The Ohio National Guard has two state partners. Since 1993, the Ohio National Guard has partnered with Hungary and in September 2006, the Ohio National Guard began a partnership with the Republic of Serbia.

The state partners actively participate in a host of security cooperation activities ranging from bilateral familiarization and training events to exercises, fellowship-style internships, and civic leader visits. Key areas of engagement include cybersecurity; chaplain training; nonlethal peacekeeping focus training and exercises; intelligence training; chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear (CBRN) training; disaster preparedness response training; senior leader collaborations; military professional development; and aviation planning/support training. All activities are coordinated through the theater combatant commanders, the respective U.S. ambassadors' country teams, and other agencies as appropriate, to ensure that National Guard support is tailored to meet both U.S. and country objectives.



The ONGSP covers 100% of tuition charges for courses applicable to, or leading to, an associate or bachelor's degree, a diploma-granting nursing program, or approved trade certification, credential-certifying, or licensing programs at participating public colleges and universities (100% of the state public college average tuition rate at private colleges and universities as defined by the Ohio Board of Regents).

New Camp Perry readiness center groundbreaking

Ohio National Guard and local officials conducted the ceremonial groundbreaking for a new readiness center at Camp Perry Joint Training Center in Port Clinton, Ohio, Oct. 21, 2024. This federal and state partnership construction project is expected to cost \$20 million, will be 60,000 square feet in size, and has an estimated completion date of December 2025. When completed, the new readiness center will provide space for training, administration, and logistical functions for three units within the 37th Infantry Brigade Combat Team.

The 180th Fighter Wing, located at Toledo Air National Guard Base in Swanton (Toledo), Ohio, operates the F-16 Fighting Falcon jet aircraft. The 180th FW trains, organizes, and equips expeditionary war fighters to deploy, fight, and win worldwide, with minimum response time, in cases of national emergency or war. The 180th FW provides for America — protection of the homeland, effective combat power, and defense support to civil authorities. The 180th FW has access to multiple military operating airspaces and air-to-ground gunnery ranges perfectly suited for the capabilities of the F-16. Centrally located with access to three major military operations area (MOA) airspace complexes, the 180th FW regularly uses the Buckeye and Brush Creek MOA airspaces in southern Ohio, the Alpena MOA airspace complex in northern Michigan, and the Indiana Air Range Complex MOA in southeast Indiana. To stay ready and razor sharp in the execution of its 24/7 aerospace control alert mission, the 180th FW conducts monthly training exercises in the surrounding national airspace regions to enhance command and control, and air traffic control integration with fighter escort for its alert intercept mission.

The State Defense Force (SDF) comprises the Ohio Military Reserve, Ohio Naval Militia, and Ohio Cyber Reserve.

As integral parts of the Adjutant General's Department, these organizations have specific roles that enhance the capabilities of the Ohio National Guard and provide additional civil-military expertise and functionality.

The SDF has an exclusive focus on protecting the state. Elements of the SDF share similarities, with regard to rank and organization (Ohio Military Reserve and U.S. Army; Ohio Naval Militia and U.S. Navy), but are not part of the federally funded Reserve Components, like the Army and Air National Guard.



CYBER RESERVE

Craig W. Baker

Organized in 2020, the Ohio Cyber Reserve (OhCR) comprises civilian cyber professionals from academia and private/public enterprise.

These volunteers form regional OhCR teams that are available for the governor to assist eligible municipalities, state agencies, and other governmental entities with cybersecurity vulnerabilities and provide recommendations to reduce cyber threats. OhCR volunteers provide workforce development to train the cyber talent of the future and assist STEM teachers by providing mentors for high school cyber clubs. OhCR members are true volunteers; they are not compensated for their training or service, unless activated by the governor to perform state active duty.

The OhCR is one of only a few cyber preparedness and response elements nationwide, established at the state level under an organized militia. The passage of Ohio House Bill 52 in October 2019 authorized the establishment of the OhCR under the SDF and Adjutant General's Department.



MILITARY RESERVE

Established in 1949, the Ohio Military Reserve (OHMR) is a key part of the Adjutant General's Department. The OHMR is focused on providing capabilities related to Emergency Support Functions 6 (Mass Care) and 7 (Logistics and Resource Management) under the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Incident Command structure. The OHMR also recently gained drone/remotely piloted aircraft capabilities to support its assigned state missions. Organized similar to an Army brigade, the OHMR has the requisite training, administrative, operational, and sustainment capacity to respond to state-level emergencies. OHMR members are not compensated for their training except during state active duty missions and paid according to their pay grade/rank.



NAVAL MILITIA

Captain (Ohio) Bethany Carpenter

The Ohio Naval Militia (OHNM) is an organized, all-volunteer unit that has been serving the state of Ohio since 1896. The OHNM's primary mission is to provide safety and site security support to the weapons ranges at Camp Perry Joint Training Center, just outside Port Clinton, Ohio, on the shores Lake Erie. Like other SDF components, members of the OHNM are not compensated for their training or service unless performing state active duty missions. OHNM members conduct extensive monthly training, which includes GPS, radar, radio communications, CPR/AED, and first responder first aid. 
