Capt. Dorian Marsh joined the Ohio Army National Guard (OHARNG) in 2003 to pay for college, but stayed in the Guard for different reasons. “I was deployed in January 2004 and quickly fell in love with wearing the uniform and what it represents,” Marsh said.
