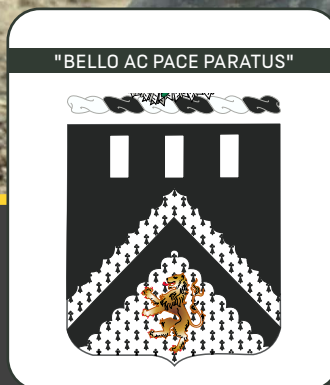
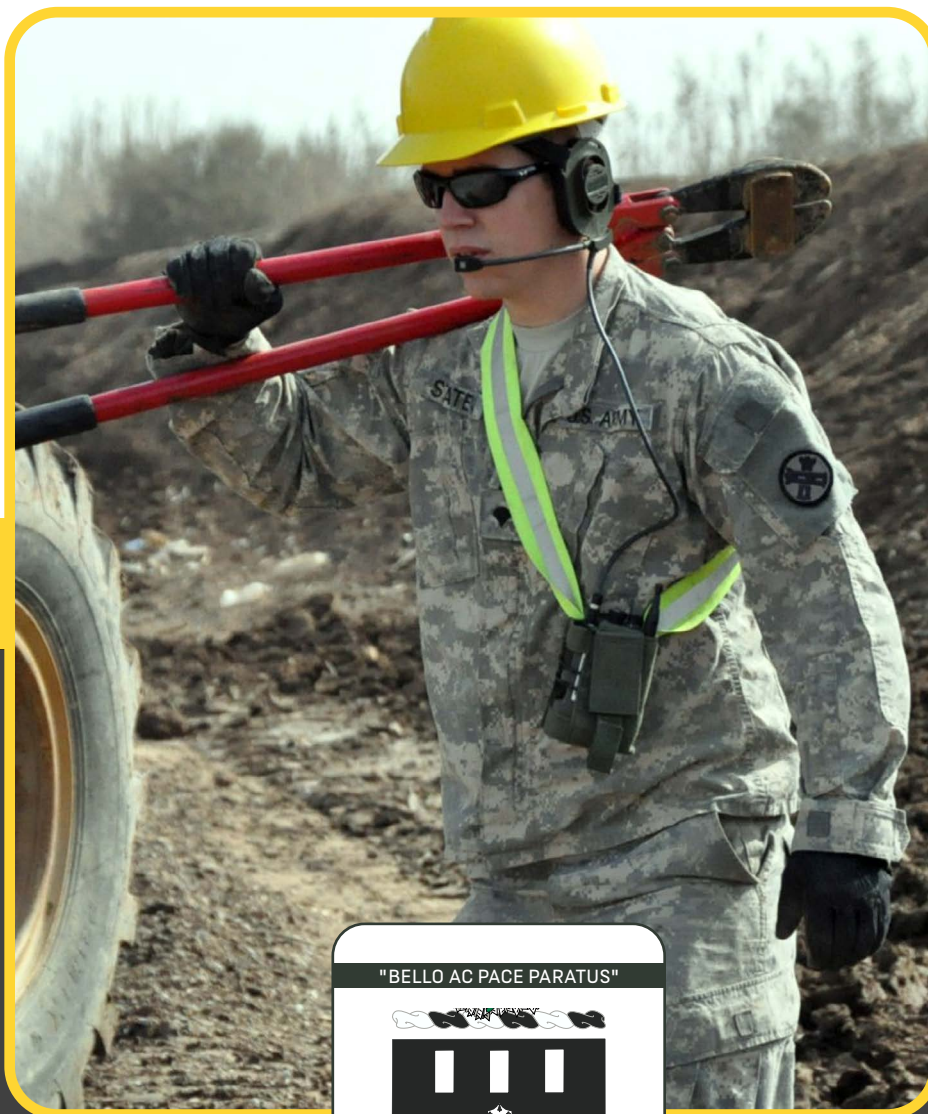

1192D ENGINEER COMPANY

The 1192d Engineer Company was organized on June 19, 1875, in Youngstown, Ohio as the Iron Guards. Capt. Roswell P. Shurtleff, a Civil War veteran, was the first commanding officer. The company was assigned to the 10th Infantry Regiment as Company B on July 6, 1876. On May 27, 1884, the local designation of the unit was changed to the Iron City Guards. On May 11, 1887, the company was redesignated as Company H, 5th Infantry Regiment and the local designation of the unit changed to the Logan Rifles in honor of Gen. John A. Logan. Logan's son, John A. Logan Jr., who was later killed in action in the Philippines and awarded the Medal of Honor, commanded the company from 1889 to 1892.

The company was in federal service from May to November 1898 during the War with Spain and was reorganized in Youngstown in July 1899. The company returned to active duty from June 1916 to March 1917 for service along the Mexican Border. On April 3, 1917, the unit was redesignated as Company B, 10th Infantry Regiment and once again entered active service in July for World War I. Company B was sent to Camp Sheridan, Ala. in August and was redesignated Sept. 15, 1917 as Company B, 135th Machine Gun Battalion and assigned to the 37th Division. The company arrived in France in June 1918, and participated in the Meuse-Argonne Offensive in September. The division then moved to Belgium and was part of the final offensive in the Ypres-Lys campaign, taking part in the offensive over the Esquat River.

The unit was reorganized in Youngstown on May 1, 1921, as Company H, 3d Infantry Regiment and was further redesignated on July 1, 1921, as Company H, 145th Infantry. The unit returned to federal service on Oct. 15, 1940, and was sent to Camp Shelby, Miss. for training. In June 1942, the company deployed to the South Pacific and served on Fiji, Guadalcanal, New Georgia, Bougainville and Luzon.

Following World War II, the company was reorganized in Youngstown as Company D, 145th Infantry on Oct. 28, 1947. The company returned to federal service in 1952 during the Korean War and was mobilized to Camp Polk, La., returning to Ohio in 1954. A series of successive changes reorganized the unit following the Korean War. In 1959, the unit was reorganized as Company D, 2d Battle Group, 145th Infantry; on April 1, 1963, as Troop F, 2d Squadron, 107th Armored Cavalry; on May 1, 1968, as Company B, 437th Military Police Battalion; on Feb. 1, 1972, as the 1484th Transportation Company; on June 1, 1974, as Troop K, 3d Squadron, 107th Armored Cavalry; and finally on May 1, 1977, as Company C, 112th Engineer Battalion. Since that time, the unit has remained organized in the engineer branch.

In 1994, the company was redesignated as Company D, 216th Engineer Battalion and was further redesignated as Company C on Sept. 1, 1997. The company was ordered into active federal service from December 2003 to April 2005 for the War on Terrorism and earned the Meritorious Unit Commendation (MUC) for the unit's role in Operation Iraqi Freedom. Following their return, the company location was changed from Youngstown to Newton Falls, Ohio. On Sept. 1, 2007, the unit was redesignated as the 1192d Engineer Company and was assigned to the 112th Engineer Battalion. The 1192d returned to active service for a mobilization to Iraq from 2009 to 2010 where it earned a second MUC.

On Sept. 1, 2017, the company was consolidated with the 290th Engineer Detachment, a unit that was constituted on Sept. 1, 2007, in Newton Falls and earned a MUC during a 2011-2012 mobilization to Afghanistan.

HERALDIC ITEMS



DISTINCTIVE UNIT INSIGNIA

Description/Blazon: A Silver color metal and enamel device 1 9/32 inches (3.25 cm) in height overall consisting of a shield blazoned: Per chevron Sable and ermine, a chevron engrailed counterchanged, in chief three billets palewise Argent and in base a lion rampant Or. Attached below the shield a Black scroll turned Silver inscribed BELLO AC PACE PARATUS in Silver letters.

Symbolism: The field is taken from the coat of arms of General Moses Cleveland, who founded the City of Cleveland and who, also, on August 2, 1779, was commissioned by Congress as Captain of a Company of Sappers and Miners. (Cleveland and its Environs-E.M. Avery). The three billets represent the pillars set in the roads leading up the hill to Montfaucon, which pillars were blown out by this Regiment. (See Morning Reports of Co. A, 112th Engineers, for September 28 and 29, 1918, also Battalion and Regimental war diaries). The lion is the lion of Belgium and served as a reminder that this Regiment, serving under King Albert, helped to free Belgium from the invader. The motto is reminiscent of the Cleveland Grays Semper Paratus and is peculiarly appropriate for a National Guard Regiment.

Background: The distinctive unit insignia was originally approved for the 112th Engineer Regiment on September 26, 1925. It was amended to change the wording regarding the method of wear by enlisted personnel on December 3, 1929. It was redesignated for the 112th Engineer Combat Battalion on April 30, 1945. The insignia was redesignated for the 112th Engineer Battalion on January 4, 1965.

COAT OF ARMS

Description/Blazon:

Shield: Per chevron Sable and ermine, a chevron engrailed counterchanged, in chief three billets palewise Argent and in base a lion rampant Or armed and langued Gules.

Crest: That for the regiments and separate battalions of the Ohio Army National Guard: On a wreath of the colors Argent and Sable, a sheaf of seventeen arrows bound by a sprig of buckeye fruited Proper (Aesculus glabra, two leaves with bursting burr).

Motto: BELLO AC PACE PARATUS (Prepared in Peace and War)

Symbolism: The field is taken from the coat of arms of General Moses Cleveland, who founded the City of Cleveland and who, also, on August 2, 1779, was commissioned by Congress as Captain of a Company of Sappers and Miners. (Cleveland and its Environs-E.M. Avery). The three billets represent the pillars set in the roads leading up the hill to Montfaucon, which pillars were blown out by this Regiment. (See Morning Reports of Co. A, 112th Engineers, for September 28 and 29, 1918, also Battalion and Regimental war diaries). The lion is the lion of Belgium and served as a reminder that this Regiment, serving under King Albert, helped to free Belgium from the invader. The motto is reminiscent of the Cleveland Grays Semper Paratus and is peculiarly appropriate for a National Guard Regiment. The crest is that of the Ohio Army National Guard.

Background: The coat of arms was originally approved for the 112th Engineer Regiment on May 7, 1923. It was redesignated for the 112th Engineer Combat Battalion on April 28, 1945. The insignia was redesignated for the 112th Engineer Battalion on January 4, 1965.



SHOULDER SLEEVE INSIGNIA

Description/Blazon: On a scarlet disc 2 inches (5.08cm) in diameter two white towers, each embattled of three merlons and with scarlet windows and entranceways, crossed in saltire all within a 1/8 inch (.32cm) white border.

Symbolism: The colors scarlet and white are used for Engineers. The two crossed towers, forming a saltire - a symbol used during the Crusades to reward those who scaled town walls - refer to the combat aspects of the Engineers. Furthermore, the saltire, a form of brace, alludes to engineering support to other components within the organization. The saltire formed by the two crossed towers simulates an X, the map symbol used for brigades and also simulates the Roman numeral ten (X) which with the three merlons of each tower alludes to sixteen (16), the numerical designation of the organization.

Background: The shoulder sleeve insignia was approved on December 4, 1969.

Reorganized and Federally recognized 28 October 1947 in the Ohio Army National Guard at Youngstown as Company D, 145th Infantry

Ordered into active Federal service 15 January 1952 at Youngstown

(Company D, 145th Infantry [NGUS] organized and Federally recognized 15 January 1954)

Released 15 June 1954 from active Federal service and reverted to state control; Federal recognition concurrently withdrawn from Company D, 145th Infantry (NGUS)

Reorganized and redesignated 1 September 1959 as Company D, 2d Battle Group, 145th Infantry and relieved from assignment to the 37th Infantry Division

Converted, reorganized and redesignated 1 April 1963 as Troop F, 2d Squadron, 107th Armored Cavalry Regiment
