Assistant Adjutant General for Air Selection. On July 7, the Adjutant General, Maj.Gen. Wayt announced the selection of COL Mark Bartman, Commander of the 180th Fighter Wing, as the Assistant Adjutant General for Air Designee. COL Bartman will assume the position in November, 2010, upon the retirement of current Assistant Adjutant General, Maj. Gen. AJ Feucht. In making the announcement, Maj. Gen. Wayt noted that COL Bartman has served with distinction in a number of key assignments and brings a wealth of experience and leadership to the position.

Ohio Air National Guard Names New Command Chief. Chief Master Sgt. Tamara Phillips has been chosen as the new senior enlisted Airman for the Ohio Air National Guard. She replaces Chief Master Sgt. Christopher Muncy, who was recently selected for the top enlisted job at the national level. Phillips is both the first female and first African-American state command chief in the Ohio Air National Guard. Phillips made history in 2005 when she became the first female chief for the Springfield-based 178th Fighter Wing.

"Chief Master Sgt. Phillip's extensive background in personnel makes her a superb choice to serve as the senior enlisted advisor on our Air team," said Maj. Gen. Harry "A.J." Feucht, Ohio's assistant adjutant general for Air. "Maj. Gen. (Gregory L.) Wayt, (Ohio adjutant general) and I will rely on her judgment and advice, much the same as we did with Chief Master Sergeant Muncy." As the state command chief, Phillips serves as a mentor and guide for the 5,000 Airmen in the Ohio Air National Guard. She said she believes her personnel background will be extremely beneficial because she knows what it takes to manage an Air Force career from beginning to end; something she feels will help her when assisting Airmen throughout Ohio. In making the announcement, Maj. Gen. Wayt noted, "These are extremely prestigious awards and I would like to convey the extreme pride that not only I, but the entire Leadership Team of the Ohio National Guard have in their accomplishments".

This Week in Guard History: Aug. 11, 1965: Los Angeles, Calif. - What should have been a routine traffic stop in the Watts neighborhood of South Central Los Angeles developed into one of the worst race riots in American history. Tensions between the black community and city law enforcement erupted into a near war as snipers and arsonists attacked the police and fire department personnel sent to quell the disturbance.

In one of the largest deployments of aid to civil authority in American history up to that time, 12,758 California Guardsmen, drawn from two divisions - 7,560 troops from the 40th Armored Division and 5,198 from the 49th Infantry Division - were put on the streets to help restore order and protect people and property. Air Guard units from California and Arizona flew a total of 18 C-97 and five C-119 transport aircraft to airlift the 49th Infantry Division's men from Northern California to the Los Angeles area. While a number of Guardsmen returned sniper fire, it remains unclear if any civilians were killed by the Guard.

After six days and nights of civil insurrection, the city's streets were restored to peace, but at a very high cost: 34 dead, more than 1,000 injured, including several Guardsmen, 4,000 arrested and over 1,000 buildings destroyed. Government and civic leaders, including some in the black community, praised the Guardsmen for their courage, devotion to duty and fair treatment of citizens regardless of race. Four Guardsmen were awarded the California Military Cross for bravery.

No COLA This Year is Looking More Likely. Army Times, August 14, 2009. <u>http://www.armytimes.com/news</u>. Friday's announcement that consumer prices continue to fall makes the proposed 2010 military pay raise look even bigger while dimming chances of a cost-ofliving adjustment for military retirees this December. The Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics, which tracks the price of goods and services, reported that prices fell by 0.2 percent in July and by 2.1 percent in the last 12 months. The main reason for the drop is a 28 percent decline in energy costs in the last year. Energy costs climbed slightly last month but are still down for the year. Falling consumer prices would give the 3.4 percent military pay raise that is pending in Congress more buying power.

The Obama administration had requested a 2.9 percent military pay increase that would have matched the 2008 private-sector increase. For military retirees — as well as federal civilian retirees, Social Security recipients and other beneficiaries of federal benefits linked to consumer prices — the July report adds credence to the possibility there will be no Dec. 1 cost-of-living adjustment. By law, Social Security and government retirement automatically increase each year to keep pace with the rise in the Consumer Price Index, a measure of the cost of goods and services. The annual Dec. 1 increase is determined by comparing costs in the last quarter of the fiscal year — July, August and September — to costs in the last quarter of the previous fiscal year. If costs fall from one year to the next, retired pay and benefits are not cut; they are simply frozen at their current level. The fate of the 2009 cost-of-living adjustment, which would take effect on Dec. 1 and first appear in January checks, will not be known until mid-October. But the 2.1 percent drop in prices in July 2009 compared to the same month last year is a strong indicator of what to expect.

President Obama: Fixing VA could take years. Army Times, August 14, 2009.

<u>http://www.armytimes.com/news</u>. President Barack Obama not only wants to improve the treatment of America's veterans, but also to reach out to homeless veterans, as well as those who have turned their backs on — or are unaware of — the benefits they've earned.

"What we're trying to do is just break down the hurdles that exist between veterans and VA," Obama told Military Times and a small group of other defense reporters in an Aug. 4 meeting in the White House Roosevelt Room. But lowering one of those hurdles — creating what Obama called "a VA that is consumer-friendly, that is oriented not towards keeping people out but bringing people in" — will not happen quickly, he said.

"It's fair to say that this is a multiyear project," Obama said. "We are going to be working vigilantly. We're going to keep on pushing. We're going to keep on prodding to make sure that both VA and DoD understand these very human issues are dealt with in the most thoughtful and effective way as possible." As evidence of that effort, Obama and Veterans Affairs Secretary Eric Shinseki touted a boost in VA funding, an increase of 4,000 claims adjusters since January 2007, a total of 18,000 mental health providers, a national suicide hotline, technological improvements in the benefits claims process, the ongoing effort to create electronic medical records that VA and the Pentagon can easily share and a more proactive and helpful attitude at both agencies.
