**Ohio National Guard Earns Honors in National Media Contests**. The Ohio National Guard recently garnered four first-place finishes in the 2009 National Guard Bureau media contest. This year's competition included more than 700 print stories and about 140 broadcast packages. Ohio winners included the Buckeye Guard magazine, published by the state public affairs office and edited by 1SG Steve Toth, which earned first place honors in the print magazine category for the second year in a row. This marks the 16th time since 1992 that the Buckeye Guard has been judged among the top three state magazines in the National Guard, including 12 first place finishes. Ohio competed against 16 other National Guard magazine publications this year, including Kentucky's Bluegrass Guard, which took second place and Michigan's Wolverine Guard, which took third.

The state's Office of Community Outreach won first place in Community Relations Category B, with Minnesota's Red Bull Nation earning second place honors. Sgt. Joel Gottke of the 196th Mobile Public Affairs Detachment, which recently mobilized for its second deployment in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom, took an individual first place award in the television sports report category. The 196th was another repeat winner, earning consecutive first place finishes in the local television newscast category, with "Eye on Ohio," which this year also took first place honors in the Department of Army's Maj. Gen. Keith L. Ware public affairs competition. The DA-level competition is judged by the U.S. Army's Office of the Chief of Public Affairs and sponsored by the Secretary of the Army. The package will now go on to compete in the military's most prestigious media competition – the Defense Department's Thomas Jefferson Awards.

**Working to Preserve the Legacy of a True American Hero.** In an effort to ensure that the legacy of a true American hero lives on, Sen. Voinovich recently introduced a bill (S.2933) to determine the suitability and feasibility of designating the Colonel Charles Young Home as a unit of the National Park System (NPS). Sen. Voinovich was pleased to travel to Xenia, Ohio to discuss the legislation

with the local community. Col. Young made significant military and public service contributions to Ohio and the nation. He was a distinguished African-American officer in the United States Army, the third African-American to graduate from West Point, and a commander of combat troops in the Spanish-American and Mexican Wars. His service in the Army between 1884 and 1922 illustrates the changing nature of race relations in the United States during a period spanning from the end of the Civil War to the beginning of the Civil Rights movement. As the commander of an Army unit assigned to protect and develop Seguoia National Park and General Grant National Park in California, Col. Young was recognized as the first African-American to be the Superintendent of a National Park. He also taught at Wilberforce University and was an accomplished linguist. Sen. Voinovich's bill would authorize the Secretary of the Interior to conduct a special resource study to determine the suitability and feasibility of designating Col. Young's home in Xenia as a unit of the NPS. The legislation was heard during a March 17 National Parks Subcommittee hearing. Central State University (CSU), one of two Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) in Ohio, has taken over ownership of The Colonel Charles Young Home. Sen. Voinovich's support of Ohio's HBCUs dates back to his tenure as governor of Ohio and mayor of Cleveland. As a U.S. Senator he continues to support Ohio's HBCUs and is pleased to assist CSU in its efforts to move forward in designating Col. Young's home as an official site in the NPS.

**Army Drops Bayonets, Revamps Training**. FORT JACKSON, S.C. — New soldiers are grunting through the kind of stretches and twists found in "ab blaster" classes at suburban gyms as the Army revamps its basic training regimen for the first time in three decades. Heeding the advice of Iraq and Afghanistan combat veterans, commanders are dropping five-mile runs and bayonet drills in favor of zigzag sprints and exercises that hone core muscles. Battlefield sergeants say that's the kind of fitness needed to dodge across alleys, walk patrol with heavy packs and body armor or haul a buddy out of a burning vehicle.

Trainers also want to toughen recruits who are often more familiar with Facebook than fistfights. "Soldiers need to be able to move quickly under load, to be mobile under load, with your body armor, your weapons and your helmet, in a stressful situation," said Frank Palkoska, head of the Army's Fitness School at Fort Jackson, which has worked several years on overhauling the regime. "We geared all of our calisthenics, all of our running movements, all of our warrior skills, so soldiers can become stronger, more powerful and more speed driven," Palkoska said. The exercises are part of the first major overhaul in Army basic fitness training since men and women began training together in 1980, he said. The new plan is being expanded this month at the Army's four other basic training installations — Fort Leonard Wood, Mo., Fort Sill, Okla., Fort Benning, Ga., and Fort Knox, Ky. **Campaign Stars Approved for Latest OIF Phases**. The following Military Times article, published on Thursday March 11, 2010,, describes changes to the Iraqi Campaign Medal. Bronze campaign stars recognizing the 2007-08 surge of American troops into Iraq, as well as current stabilization efforts, have been authorized for wear on the Iraq Campaign Medal, the Pentagon announced Thursday. The surge campaign phase has been established as running from January 1, 2007, to

December 31, 2008; the second campaign star, for the phase identified as "Iraqi Sovereignty," began January 1, 2009, and will continue through a date to be determined.

Although all who have served in "direct support" in the Iraq war on or after March 13, 2003, are authorized to wear the medal, the stars recognize designated campaigns during the war. Four previous phases had been identified, and service members who have qualified for the Iraq Campaign Medal can display a bronze campaign star on their medal for each designated campaign phase in which they took part. The other four phases, announced previously, are: Liberation of Iraq: March 19, 2003, to May 1, 2003; Transition of Iraq: May 2, 2003, to June 28, 2004; Iraqi Governance: June 29, 2004, to December 15, 2005; and the "National Resolution" phase: December 16, 2005, to January 9, 2007. The respective military departments are currently working specific implementation guidance.

Phase Two of the process to remove printed Social Security numbers from retiree identification cards set to begin early this year has been delayed until further notice.

When a new plan is made available to the Services, information will be advertised through Air Force retiree news outlets and other public affairs media.

There are more than 1,500 ID card centers worldwide. To find the nearest center, visit the RAPIDS site locator at www.dmdc.osd.mil/rsl/owa/home. Officials urge cardholders to call first to ensure duty hours and determine what documents are required. People must present two forms of identification and one must be an unexpired federal- or state-issued photo ID.

**Update on the Ohio Veteran's Bonus**. The Ohio Department of Veterans Services (DVS) is diligently creating an application process so that eligible veterans can request the bonus that was overwhelmingly approved by Ohio voters last November third. DVS has drafted a comprehensive set of rules that will be reviewed in the Ohio Legislature by the Joint Committee on Agency Rule Review. At the same time, the Ohio Public Facilities Commission is taking the necessary steps so that the bonds which will finance the bonuses can be created, advertised and sold to investors.

Several other crucial but time-consuming steps also are underway:

1. Computer software and programs are being created to review the applications and determine eligibility.

2. Staff must be hired and trained to process the applications that could come from an estimated 200,000 veterans who are Ohio residents.

3. When applications are submitted, all information must be verified with military and other records to ensure that veterans are eligible and that they are applying for all that they have earned.

Nobody can accurately predict when DVS will tell eligible veterans to begin applying for the bonus and when the first checks will be mailed. Based on the experiences of other states however, DVS hopes to be mailing the first checks in October. Then, the process will continue for several months as applications are received and processed. DVS wants to ensure that the application process is user friendly for Ohio veterans and that our veterans get the service they deserve. DVS will use the news media, their Web site (www.dvs.ohio.gov) and various other communication vehicles to advise eligible veterans when it is ready to receive their bonus applications. The Ohio Department of Veterans Services wants the bonus application and approval process to be easily understood, accurate and efficient.

### This Week in Guard History.

March 19, 1945: Wattweiler, Germany — Colorado's 157th Infantry, an element of the 45th Infantry Division, seizes this town after breaching the Nazi defense barrier known as the Siegfried Line. The 45th Division entered combat in July 1943 when it took part in the invasion of Sicily. It later made assault landings at Salerno and Anzio in Italy and on the Riviera in southern France. By war's end it would capture Nuremberg, the symbolic home of the Nazi movement, and Munich, where Adolf Hitler got his start leading the Nazi Party.

### This week in Ohio Guard History

18 March 1910: Battery B, 1st Battalion, 174th Air Defense Artillery Regiment (Woodlawn) is organized at Hamilton as Company M, 1st Infantry Regiment.

24 March 1942: The 216th Engineer Battalion is constituted in the Army of the United States as Headquarters, 14th Ordnance Battalion.

11 March 1993. An Air Force report on Base Realignment and Closure recommended that, contrary to the recommendations of the 1991 commission, the 121st Air Refueling Wing (ARW) and 160th Air Refueling Group, Ohio ANG, should remain at the Rickenbacker ANG Base, Ohio.

12 March 1976. A KC-135A from Ohio's 145th Air Refueling Squadron became the first ANG tanker to participate in a Strategic Air Command (SAC) over water air refueling. The Guard aircraft helped SAC KC-135s refuel A-7s deploying from California to Hawaii.
